## **Meditation- Practicing the Way of Love**

Leader: Practicing the Way begins with remembering. Zephaniah makes two points to remember. First, remember all that God does to protect us from harm and oppressors. Second, remember the spiritual gift of joy—to "sing aloud" and "rejoice and exult."

Note that Zephaniah used more than double the verses to recite God's grace toward humanity than to tell us to be joyful. Was it because Zephaniah doubted that humans would *believe* in God's grace if they didn't have more words to commend God's graciousness?

Practicing the Way and its attendant actions are about the *embodiment* of being followers of Jesus—of embodying the hope we find in Jesus Christ. We share the Good News of God in

Christ because it is good news that is too life-saving to keep secret from our fellow humans. We Christians strive to be the carriers and advocates of the hope found in Christ because its all-loving, incarnational perspective aligns us with God's command to love God and love our neighbors.

Zephaniah reminds us to *remember* to be joyful in our sharing the hope that Christ brings us. Zephaniah tells us to "sing aloud" and to rejoice and exult. Practicing the spiritual gift of embodying joy enhances our advocacy of hope in Christ.

Remember, says Zephaniah, to be joyful because of everything that God does for us. — Lelanda Lee

Leader: We recall the times we have struggled to practice your Way of Love and yet we continue to joyfully walk on the journey you set before us.

People: Sacred Mystery, visit us and fill us with your Spirit. Bring your good news to life within us. Give us courage to walk in the way of the beloved community that you set before us.
