## **Meditation-: Proclaiming the Dream**

Leader: This time of Advent is full of preparation and prayer, where we are called to make preparations for the indwelling of the Lord. But we are also called to proclaim this Good News in the world. Mary was carrying Christ into the world; it wasn't always easy or comfortable, and yet she was able to deliver this life-giving change into a broken world—a broken world that led her to boldly share the challenges of God who bestowed her with a child. Mary knows that God will cast out the mighty and the rich and lift up the lowly. She is moved to proclaim this powerful message.

During our own preparations for Advent, how can we emulate Mary, teach Mary, and encourage children to embody Mary? How can we carry Christ into a broken world, especially when it isn't easy or comfortable? Where are we called to boldly proclaim the dream of God put to words by Mary in the Magnificat? Ultimately, we are able to enter into this proclamation through God's bountiful grace and mercy, following the example of the ever-blessed Virgin Mary. — the Rev. Lydia Simmons
