

Today's Woman in Music



Carlotta Ferrari (b. 1975), composer of today's prelude, is a prolific composer of organ, choral, and chamber music. Having taught several years in China, she now is on the music composition faculty of the ESE in Florence, Italy. Today's prelude is based on a Gregorian chant introit, with a text that translates to "Incline your ear to me, O Lord, and hear my cry," a text that can relate to our first reading from Job.

What Did You Do to the Creed? Where is "and the Son"?

Since about March, we've been using the version of the Nicene Creed found in Enriching Our Worship 1 (EOW 1). This version has a notable omission: "We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father." What happened to "and the Son" at the end of that sentence?

The Nicene Creed is the abbreviated title for the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed, so called because it was developed at the Council of Nicea (325 CE) and the Council of Constantinople (381 CE). The Creed is an ancient statement of the faith agreed on by the whole church, East and West. The original wording described the Holy Spirit as proceeding only from the Father. In the 6th century, the Western (Latin) half of the Church added *filioque*, which means "and the Son," to the statement about the Holy Spirit's precedence. While perhaps well-intentioned (it was meant to counter a heresy questioning Jesus' full divinity), neither an ecumenical council nor the Eastern Church adopted the change. Needless to say, this unilateral alteration did not help ease tensions between the Eastern Church and Western Church.

In 1976, the Anglican members of the Anglican-Orthodox Joint Doctrinal Commission agreed that the filioque should not be included because it was not approved at an ecumenical council. In 1978, bishops at the Lambeth Conference recommended Anglican Communion churches consider omitting the filioque. Restoration of the original wording was endorsed at the 1988 Lambeth Conference, the 1990 Anglican Consultative Council meeting, and the 1993 joint meeting of Anglican Primates and the Anglican Consultative Council. The 1994 General Convention affirmed the intention of the Episcopal Church to remove the filioque at the next revision of the Prayer Book. Until then, EOW 1 provides an authorized version of the Creed that omits the filioque, which is what we have been using.
